



Pastor's Pen

Dear friends,

As I write this note, I am thinking that I have, perhaps, divided the congregation with the words I spoke from the pulpit last Sunday, October 22...insofar as some of you know that the title of my message was, "After Church" and some of you do not. Here is the "nutshell" version of my message: Johnny's mother looked out the window and noticed that he was "playing church" with Minnie, the family cat. He had placed her on a lawn chair and Johnny, pretending to be a Pastor, seemed to be "preaching" to her. Johnny's mother shook her head, smiled, and went about her work.

It wasn't long before she heard yelling, meowing, and hissing. She ran back to the open window. Now, it appeared as though Johnny was attempting to *baptize* the cat in a tub of water. She called out, "Johnny, stop that! You should know that Minnie is afraid of water!"

Johnny, still wrestling with Minnie, looked up and said, "Well, she should have thought about that before she chose to join my church."

On Sunday December 4, following Worship, Pastor Nick and I will be hosting a New Member Gathering. We will chat with you who are considering joining in the membership of First Congregational UCC, Appleton. We promise "pleasant" conversation, even if you are afraid of water!

I'd like to draw your attention to what it means for each one of us when we join in communal "belonging" and make a commitment to "being the church" together. Read: Matthew 22:15-22

Why be a church? Can't we worship God in a fishing boat or on the walking trail on Sunday mornings? Can't we gather with our friends at the Performing Arts Center and be entertained by music of the Masters and be assured of a good seat and valet parking? Isn't it good enough to give a yearly donation to the Red Cross and drop off food at a food pantry? Can't we satisfy our spiritual craving by reading a "self-help" book or listening to YouTube "music for mediation"? That would be one side of the coin that Jesus is talking about. We are not involved in a coin-toss organization. I believe that when Jesus tells US to: "Give therefore to Caesar the things that are Caesar's and to God the things that are God's." (NRSV) We are drawn into a holy "belonging."

In the United Church of Christ, we do not **test one another**, nor do we place expectations on one another that require us to conform to certain beliefs. What drew you to this community of faith? Were you "church shopping"? Or did you just feel compelled to walk through these doors; when you did, you felt a clear *call to belonging*? It has been much more than a Sunday morning appointment with God. You found *real people* here who remembered your name. Where would you have had the opportunity to worship, pray, praise, join in fellowship, laugh and cry with this group of people if you hadn't walked through these doors???

Belonging to the church is becoming part of a community of faith where all are welcome, no matter who it is or where they are on life's journey.

Why do you think I chose the words, "After Church?" I want to suggest *a bit of a change* from now on. Whenever you find yourself saying, "After Church, we are taking a ride up north." Or, "After Church, let's stay for coffee hour." STOP and think, and know that it really is **ALWAYS CHURCH**, whoever we are, whatever we are doing. whatever day it is. Church is a way of living and loving. I am the church. You are the church. We are the church together.

There really is no such thing as, "After Church!"

Take a deep breath. Let it out.

Keynote Speaker: Ana Garcia-Ashley


Ana Garcia-Ashley's family emigrated from the Dominican Republic during the 1960s to flee the chaos of Trujillo's dictatorship. Intensely interested in the intersection of politics and faith, Ana developed a foundation for organizing congregations. During her tenure as lead organizer, Milwaukee's MICAH won a \$5 million reinvestment commitment from the city's banks. Ana was a founding organizer for WISDOM and became Executive Director of The Gamaliel National Network in 2012. Ana's deep sense of organizing as a ministry, her interest in social justice and her experience as a naturalized immigrant dovetail perfectly with the goals of ESTHER and WISDOM. We are "a community of people living out our faith and values to collectively transform our communities and bring about justice locally, nationally and globally."

We are truly saddened by the genocide of their ancestors, the seizure of their lands, and the repression of their cultures and languages. We acknowledge that we benefit from the economic and social legacy left by settler colonialism.



We are grateful that many members of these original Nations have honorably served and defended the United States. We strive to honor their cultures and their insightful stewardship of this land and all creatures on it, recognizing our common interest in protecting its air, water, soils, and web of life for all future generations.

We commit ourselves through study and immersion experiences to learn the history and cultures of these peoples and their traditional knowledge.
