NUN KOMM, DER HEIDEN HEILAND

This is one of the longest-running hymns in the church. Written in the fourth century by Ambrose of Milan, we hear the first stanza presented by a single voice in its original chant melody. This melody was later adapted into the chorale we know today by Martin Luther in the 16th century. The text scans the whole story from manger to cross. The result is to make "Come" embrace Advent's paradox: Christ's first coming, second coming, and coming to us here and now.



CELEBRATION OF HOLY COMMUNION

INVITATION TO COMMUNION

Pastor Nick: This morning we once again gather to receive the bread and the cup. We are an "Open Communion" church, meaning that we require no specific creed or confession in order to participate in this meal. These are the gifts of God for the people of God, and all are welcome to participate.

Pastor Mary Jo: Holy God, our Source and Ending, Alpha and Omega, we give thanks For calling all creation into being and for setting the earth on its foundations. You have filled the world with your creatures and have called all things good.

The heavenly beings are your messengers night and day, and with them we sing and give glory to you:

All: Holy, holy, Lord God of power and might. Heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest!

Pastor Nick: In these latter days, God leaned toward the earth and spoke to us by a Son, Jesus the Christ. Jesus came among us as a baby, humbly born, cradled beside the beasts and warmed by their breath, human as we are, in need of human love.

Pastor Mary Jo: Yet, kings bowed down before him, bringing gifts, and emperors were troubled by his reign. This Child in whom all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, this Word of God made flesh and full of grace was sent to deliver us from our sin, from the power of evil and the fear of death.

Rejoicing in all that God has done for us, we proclaim the mystery of our faith:

All: Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again!

Pastor Nick: Holy God, as you visited us in the birth of Jesus, visit us now by the power of your Spirit, in this bread and in this cup. We remember how Jesus took

bread and blessed and broke it and gave it to his friends, saying, "Take, eat, This is my body, given for you."

Pastor Mary Jo: After supper, he took a cup of wine and blessed and gave it to them, saying: "Drink this, all of you. This cup is the new covenant in my blood, poured out for you and for many for the forgiveness of sin. Do this in remembrance of me."

GATHERING OF JOYS AND CONCERNS

Pastor Nick: The Lord be with you.

All: And also with you.

Pastor Nick: Let us pray.

Let us pray together the prayer that Jesus taught us...

All: Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name. Thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread and *forgive us our debts*, as we forgive our debtors. And lead us not into temptation, but, deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom and the power and the glory, forever. Amen.

SHARING OF THE ELEMENTS

Pastor Mary Jo: Friends, when the Communion baskets are passed, you are invited to eat the bread individually. We will drink the juice together after all have been served. We receive this sacrament with Jesus's promise to be present in our midst.

The bread which we break is the communion of the body of Christ.

Pastor Nick: The cup of blessing that we bless is the communion of the blood of Christ. Emmanuel, God with us, in the hopes and fears of all our years, we come for comfort, for peace of mind and peace on earth. We come for a blessing on our hands and the bread that we will receive in them; we come for a blessing on our lips and the cup that we will lift to drink. Amen.

Dear friends,

Did you know...the new <u>Church Year begins today</u>? We, as Christians, will begin this *new year*, *as we do year after year*, by re-visiting the stories in the life of Jesus. The anticipation of his birth begins now as traditions of the season of Advent and the approaching season of Christmas already surround us.

One tradition of the Church Year, originating in the 4th century, is to use color to differentiate the "liturgical seasons." Look around. There are blue banners and blue Advent candles that were not being used last week! **Blue** is the "liturgical color" for Advent. It's the color of the night sky and symbolizes Christ, who, in one ancient Advent song, is called the "Dayspring."

The colors of the Christmas season (Dec. 24-Jan. 5) are **white** or **gold**, symbolizing joy! The "12 days of Christmas" invite the church to reflect on John 1:14: "The Word became a human being and lived among us, and we have seen his glory...."

The season after Epiphany, Jan. 6th, spreads the Good News of Jesus Christ from its source in the Jewish community to all nations on earth. The liturgical color for Epiphany, is **green**, the color of growth.

The Season of Lent, symbolized by **purple**, is bracketed by the *mourning* **black** of Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

The liturgical color for the Easter Season is the "celebratory" **white** or **gold**. When the season ends on Pentecost Sunday, white is replaced with **red**, reminding us of fire—a symbol of the Holy Spirit.

The longest season of the church year," Pentecost," during which we explore the mission of the church we again use the color **green** to symbolize growth.

Our journey through the seasons of the church year begins again each Advent! The use of these traditional colors in decorations, banners and stoles connects us with the wider church, the Body of Christ, and brings to our minds the stories in the life of Jesus that we treasure *by heart*.

In the coming weeks, as you carry your decorations of the "season" down from the attic, may you also treasure each story *they* tell, remembering that Jesus is the reason...

On this first Sunday of Advent, hang up a bell of hope and ring it!
