



Sanctuary Accessibility

As people of faith, we are blessed with the wonders and challenges of living in close community with one another. We do this in small group studies, on the various ministries of the church, and in our sanctuary every Sunday. So, it only follows that we need to be thoughtful about all the needs of community members to have as equal participation as possible in our common life together. Jesus really modeled and mandated inclusion when speaking to the pharisees and sharing the words of Isaiah which read:

"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor." – Luke 4:18

Note that Jesus was modeling radical inclusion and stating it is his mission to liberate people and bring justice to their situations. He said all this while speaking to church leaders and they got so angry - they even threw him out! Christians have long struggled to be fully inclusive, to be fully welcoming, and to know how to and choose to work for the rights of all people.

A variety of committees have gathered feedback from church members, pastors, and observed practices from other church communities in considering how we need to improve our sanctuary's accessibility. The goal is that this space will be more functional and offer more equitable access for those with varying levels of physical abilities.

Thus, you may have noticed that there are some changes taking place in our sanctuary.

The most obvious change is the addition of a new, beautiful, and rock-solid railing leading up to the podium microphone. There's also permanent black tape around the chancel on each step as the coloration of the flooring makes seeing the steps difficult. The hearing loop was recently updated. In the back you will notice our first "Wheelchair Accessible" sign. More chairs will be removed at the entry, creating spaces for wheelchairs. Lastly, a portion of a set of pews close to the front will also be removed. This will give people with assisted mobility devices the option to sit up front and not block an aisle.

It's small steps, but they are important steps for us to take. Jesus models for us a life that is wildly inclusive and asks us to create a community where equality and justice are offered to all the members of His body. So let us embrace these changes as a sign of our growth in understanding one another, and in turn, understanding the passionate desire to liberate as modeled in our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

280 Giggling Joyful Children! This is what evolved from a generous donation being directed to a need that became known. Through conversations with our Kenya partners and secondary school scholarship students, we became aware of the need for primary school uniforms. Many students wrote in their recent profiles of being sent home in primary school until their parents or community could provide them with a uniform. Due to years of cattle rustling, drought and mudslides many families in Kerio valley have faced severe economic challenges. At the same time, families donated funds to be directed to a place of need within the Kenya partnership. Our team in Kenya identified primary schools along the tribal/county border that encountered the most challenges in cattle rustling, border killings, natural disasters and displacement. Now 280 children are donning new school uniforms, raising their hands in class, standing in front of their class with pride and confidence! These children have been lifted to new heights and someday will recall to others the day they received their new uniform and how that took them down a new path in life! We share this as a remarkable way that God's love shines through and connects us all. A new uniform costs less than \$10 yet made a life changing difference to 280 children in Kerio Valley, Kenya.





With Thanks for Legacy Gifts: Our church has been blessed with memorials, bequests, and special gifts that enable support for First Congregational's mission above and beyond the annual operating budget. Their efforts were supplemented by those of other energized volunteers on Service Sunday. And, for many years, Jeff and Siri Witt have purchased, planted, and cared for potted annuals. As a result of many hands, the Memorial Garden is once again a place of beauty and peacefulness. Nearby, thanks to ecologist and church member Sandy Gillum and botanist Keith Phelps, the ravine benefited from a professional survey of both its native and non-native plants as a first step toward the preparation of a management plan for the ravine area.

Land Covenant

The land now occupied by Appleton, Wisconsin and surrounding areas - including the current site of First Congregational UCC - was the home, hunting, gathering, and farming land of the First Peoples of this territory: the Ho Chunk Nation and the Menominee Nation.

Other tribes were forcibly re-located to this region by the actions of colonialism. Despite centuries of reprehensible treatment, the peoples of these sovereign nations are robust and enduring among us.

We are truly saddened by the genocide of their ancestors, the seizure of their lands, and the repression of their cultures and languages. We acknowledge that we benefit from the economic and social legacy left by settler colonialism.
