All: We carry palms and wear crosses, reminding ourselves that both ecstasy and agony, joy and disappointment are part of our living.

One: Today we say: "Blessed is the One who comes in God's name! Hosanna!"

All: This One is Jesus of Nazareth —teacher, builder, Christ.

One: In ancient Jerusalem, people gave Jesus a wonderful welcome.

All: Today we celebrate the presence of the living Christ!

SCRIPTURE READING Mark 11:1-11

When they were approaching Jerusalem, at Bethphage and Bethany, near the Mount of Olives, he sent two of his disciples and said to them, "Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately as you enter it you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden; untie it and bring it. If anyone says to you, 'Why are you doing this?' just say this: 'The Lord needs it and will send it back here immediately.'"

They went away and found a colt tied near a door, outside in the street. As they were untying it, some of the bystanders said to them, "What are you doing, untying the colt?" They told them what Jesus had said, and they allowed them to take it. Then they brought the colt to Jesus and threw their cloaks on it, and he sat on it.

Many people spread their cloaks on the road, and others spread leafy branches that they had cut in the fields. Then those who went ahead and those who followed were shouting,

"Hosanna! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! Blessed is the coming kingdom of our ancestor David! Hosanna in the highest heaven!"

Then he entered Jerusalem and went into the temple, and when he had looked around at everything, as it was already late, he went out to Bethany with the twelve.

Note: The Sanctuary Choir will lead us into the Sanctuary ringing random handbells, followed by everyone joining in singing the hymn.



Pastor's Pen March 24, 2024

Wave your palms.... Anyway.

Ever been accused of being a party downer? You know, the one that isn't up for the fun, brings the group down, would rather be moody than joyous? I know in a lot of parties I went to in college I would be asked "So what are you studying" and I would say "Psychology" and then the response would be "Oh so you are going to be a psychologist then?", "No, a pastor." And that was the moment I was the party downer! People would shuffle away, hide their drink, or look like they had just been forced to go to confession.

Well, like usual, Jesus mixes everything up for us because Jesus was both a party crasher and the one willing to celebrate. In the Gospel of Luke, it reads:

After throwing their cloaks on the colt, they set Jesus on it. As he rode along, people kept spreading their cloaks on the road. As he was now approaching the path down from the Mount of Olives, the whole multitude of the disciples began to praise God joyfully with a loud voice for all the deeds of power that they had seen - Luke 19:35-37

Then, immediately after instigating this royal party with everyday items, Jesus wept over the city, prophesizing its destruction by its enemies. Just to make his countercultural point, Jesus went into the temple, driving people out and calling them robbers and thieves! Palm Sunday is in a true sense: a protest. People joyously protested a radical change and laid their palms on the road for the one that embodied a righteousness that they longed for in a much-needed revolution of social and religious justice.

In the Gospel of John is where we find the word "Hosanna" used on Palm Sunday. Hosanna is an Aramaic expression meaning 'help, I pray' or 'save, I pray.' Likewise, for many Christians now, 'hosanna in the highest' is equivalent to 'praise be to God.' So, to say Hosanna on this day is like laying palms on a dusty road; it's both an act of invitation to the saving work of Jesus and offers up a joy filled acknowledgement to the presence of our living and transformative God.

I hate to be a party crasher, maybe a little bit of a downer, but today isn't a party. Today is a faithful rebuke to social injustice like racism, transgender discrimination, the weaponization of Holy Scripture, war, hate, poverty...the list is lone. But, like Jesus because we have hope in God, we mix it all up! We throw a party and ask for the savior to come again, and again, and again. We wave our palms, again and again and again. We do this in spite of the troubles of the world around us. We Christians wave our palms....Anyway.

Blessed is the one who comes!

Voting Information for the proposed constitutional changes in the upcoming April 2 ballot/constitutional amendments which are on the ballot. In-person absentee voting is from Tuesday, March 19 to Sunday, March 31, 2024.

Wisconsin constitutional amendments are on the April ballot. These will be binding and added to our Constitution if passed. Often the writing of the amendments is ambiguous, making it hard to understand...however, when assessing the immediate impact they will have on how our elections are run, they are damaging to voter access and an additional constitutional amendment is not necessary. The Wisconsin Council of

The questions on voters' ballots:

Question 1: "Use of private funds in election administration. Shall section 7 (1) of article III of the constitution be created to provide that private donations and grants may not be applied for, accepted, expended, or used in connection with the conduct of any primary, election, or referendum?"

Churches and the nonpartisan LWV Wisconsin is urging voters to Vote No.

Question 1: "Use of private funds in election administration.

Elections need to be fully funded. This amendment reduces the options for municipal governments looking for outside sources of funding for elections without providing alternative resources. This change will shift the burden even further onto taxpayers.

- 1. This change will have a negative impact on the voter experience and could lead to long lines and wait times at polling places, consolidated polling places, longer waits for election night results, and more due to lack of funding.
- 2. This change does not belong in our constitution. If the legislature wants to make this change, they should work with the governor to do so in a way that ensures our elections are fully funded.
- 3. Vote No on question 1 to ensure our clerks have the support and money they need to keep our elections running smoothly and securely.

Question 2: "Election officials. Shall section 7 (2) of article III of the constitution be created to provide that only election officials designated by law may perform tasks in the conduct of primaries, elections, and referendums?"

Question 2: "Election officials.

Elections are a lot of work. Clerks rely on a whole host of outside experts, volunteers, and community members to make sure our elections are run smoothly and the results are accurate.

- 1. Voter education organizations, like LWV, play a critical role in informing the public about their right to vote. This proposed change to our constitution ties the hands of our election officials from getting the outside support they need for our elections to function.
- 2. This change does not belong in our constitution. If the legislature wants to make this change, they should work with the governor to do so in a way that ensures our clerks are able to get the support they need to run our elections.
- 3. Vote No to question 2 to ensure our clerks have the support they need to run our elections and voters have the support they need to make informed decisions for our state.
