

#### SCRIPTURE READING | | Corinthians | 12:12-27

For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. For in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body – Jews or Greeks, slaves or free – and we were all made to drink of one Spirit. Indeed, the body does not consist of one member but of many. If the foot would say, "Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body. And if the ear would say, "Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body. If the whole body were an eye, where would the hearing be? If the whole body were hearing, where would the sense of smell be? But as it is, God arranged the members in the body, each one of them, as he chose. If all were a single member, where would the body be? As it is, there are many members yet one body. The eye cannot say to the hand, "I have no need of you," nor again the head to the feet, "I have no need of you." On the contrary, the members of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, and those members of the body that we think less honorable we clothe with greater honor, and our less respectable members are treated with greater respect, whereas our more respectable members do not need this. But God has so arranged the body, giving the greater honor to the inferior member, that there may be no dissension within the body, but the members may have the same care for one another. If one member suffers, all suffer together with it; if one member is honored, all rejoice together with it. Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it.

### Pastor's Pen

Dear friends,

I've always been enthusiastic about anniversaries. I had an extra skip in my step last Sunday because it was the one-year anniversary of when you officially called me to become one of your co-pastors, and the sheet cake is on me for the 20th anniversary of my ordination this May. But it's time we all start celebrating a truly remarkable anniversary: the 175th anniversary of the gathering of our church!

True to form, I nerded out a bit this week. I was curious what the formal term for a 175th anniversary is. My research revealed several different words, all derived from Latin. We could call it our *demisemiseptcentennial*, our *quartoseptcentennial*, our *terquasquicentennial*, or our *septaquintaquinquecentennial*. Which is to say my research revealed that we should probably just call it our 175th Anniversary!

How will we celebrate? There will be opportunities to look to our past with gratitude, our present with joy, and our future with trust. This is a great year to read Rev. John McFadden's *The Open Door: A History of First Congregational Church 1850-2000* if you haven't yet read it. (It would also be a great year for someone to work on a sequel, covering the 25 years since that book was published... any takers?) This is a great year to explore the ministries of our church, if you haven't yet attended a study, or served on a committee, or volunteered with one of our mission partners. This is a great year to make a covenantal commitment to become a member of our congregation if you've been a regular attendee for a while but haven't yet "put a ring on it." And this is a great year to faithfully and diligently pray the prayer the Isaiah Project has given our congregation: *God, grant us creativity, curiosity, and courage as we worship, work, and seek your presence. Empower us to follow Jesus into the world to love and serve our neighbors. Amen.* 

We're also looking forward to a 175th Anniversary Celebration on September 14 (mark your calendars!), and a 175th Anniversary Capital Campaign that will provide the resources to support our congregation's unfolding vision and vitality.

What a gift to bear witness to what Spirit has done and is doing. Let's say it early and often: *Happy Anniversary!*



<u>Donate to the Altadena Fire Relief Effort</u>: We've all seen the wildfire activity in Los Angeles County. Immediate reports indicate this will be the largest fire disaster in the county's history. At least 37,000 acres have been consumed by the blazes. One hundred eighty thousand people (180,000!) are currently displaced from their homes due to devastation or evacuation orders, and these fires continue to spread.

Close to our hearts, we've heard the fires destroyed the Altadena Community Church, United Church of Christ. Since the onset of this disaster, Global Hope (our UCC Wider Church team) has communicated with the Southern California and Nevada Conference

Minister. Global Hope is helping to connect Southern California and Nevada Conference staff, churches, and others affected by the wildfires with immediate resources while also preparing to support long-term recovery efforts.

Outreach Ministries voted to send \$4000 from the Beemer Endowment to assist in their recovery effort. We



know many of you would like to add to this support personally. To do that, please send a check to the church office, 724 E. South River, Appleton, WI 54915 or donate via Realm with a note "for Altadena fire." We will bundle the donations and let them know a congregation in Wisconsin is praying for them.

When you hear "The Isaiah Project," think "infrastructure." The Steering Committee and four Task Forces are prayerfully engaged in research, community partnership development, and discernment to provide recommendations to Church Council about our buildings, grounds, and neighborhood presence. These recommendations will address our current and future needs and support our mission and priorities.

<u>The Isaiah Corner</u>: Now that you've read the elevator speech (above), here is the background and a fuller description:

First Congregational United Church of Christ (FCUCC) is undertaking a generational challenge to carry out the vision of our congregation's future.

Called "The Isaiah Project," this work builds upon previous efforts to determine the mission, purpose, values and needs of the congregation.

Those efforts were driven by the need for major maintenance, renovation and possible re-purposing of our aging, 57-year-old church buildings, coupled with knowledge of significant demographic changes and a decline in attendance at mainline churches. (From 2011 to 2020, attendance in Wisconsin UCC churches fell 44%.)

The Horizon Building Team (2015 - 2020) identified building improvement opportunities to address the needs and goals of the congregation. In 2021, The Vandersall Collective was engaged to analyze future steps the congregation may consider to continue progress. The Vandersall findings captured the feelings, strengths, challenges and possibilities of the church related to moving forward. A major finding of the report was a renewed effort to bring our purpose and mission forefront as we envision our facilities and grounds' future use, as well as necessary upkeep. It is this vision, added to the base Horizon Team findings, that supports the entry point for The Isaiah Project. In March 2024 a committed group of church members convened a Steering Committee and Task Forces to synthesize previous work and move forward with actionable plans. <a href="https://www.uccappleton.org/the-isaiah-project">https://www.uccappleton.org/the-isaiah-project</a>

Mission Partner's Collections: Our congregation has two great mission partners, LEAVEN and World Relief. Outreach Ministries representatives have learned both of them need hygiene supplies donated this month. LEAVEN provides assistance to people in financial crisis and their cupboards are usually bare this time of year. World Relief is assisting about 200 newcomers who arrived with nothing to settle into apartments. We're doing the collection together as this is when both organizations have the greatest need. See their lists in the announcements below. If you see a Buy One, Get One sale, this is a really good time to make that purchase!

World Relief Hygiene Collection: World Relief needs basic hygiene items for newly arriving refugees. Soap, shampoo, toothbrushes, toothpaste, body lotion, deodorant and hand sanitizer. These items will be used in making housing ready for the new arrivals.

LEAVEN Hygiene Collection: LEAVEN helps clients in financial crisis with limited monetary assistance and referrals to existing programs in the community for which they are eligible. When available, LEAVEN distributes basic hygiene products to clients to help ease the burden of purchasing these items. All hygiene items distributed to clients are donated to LEAVEN – no budgeted funds are used. It is through the generosity of hygiene drives/collections that LEAVEN can keep a closet stocked with cleaning supplies and hygiene items. Items needed include:

- Deodorant (men's and women's)
- Toothbrushes (individually packaged)
- Shampoo (please, no jumbo-sized bottles)
- Conditioner (please, no jumbo-sized bottles)
- Disposable Razors (in small packages; please, no refillables)
- Shaving Cream
- Laundry Detergent (small bottles or packages)
