Inexplicable Joy by Hannah Garrity Inspired by Luke 15:1-3, 11b-32; Paper lace

Full to the brim with joy. An existential crisis, like the last two years of the COVID pandemic, helps us all to appreciate the joy with which the father of the prodigal son celebrates. This image depicts the joyful motion of a party, the lights in particular. The lines in this stained glass window design are inspired by photographs of light glowing and moving, dancing in the night. In the center circle, the shadow of a dancing silhouette repeats, echoing the way that we see figures move in two dimensions in the light of the night. In the corners of the window frame, architectural motifs that historically represent the Holy Trinity reflect the light as though shining themselves. Thinking about an expansive Lent as I worked on this paper lace, this image became all about joy. Joy that is misunderstood. Joy as an act of resistance. Inexplicable joy. In an expansive understanding, the joy that the father is experiencing makes sense. He shows an uncharacteristic willingness to celebrate inexplicably with joy. How can we notice and give grace to those who are experiencing inexplicable joy—particularly when it is an act of resistance? Where can we enter into their joy? Where in our own lives can we celebrate despite the incongruence of joy and pain,

joy and discord, joy and anger?

Now all the tax collectors and sinners were coming near to listen to him. And the Pharisees and the scribes were grumbling and saying, "This fellow welcomes sinners and eats with them." So he told them this parable: Then Jesus said, "There was a man who had two sons. The younger of them said to his father, 'Father, give me the share of the wealth that will belong to me.' So he divided his assets between them. A few days later the younger son gathered all he had and traveled to a distant region, and there he squandered his wealth in dissolute living. But when this son of yours came back, who has devoured your assets with prostitutes, you killed the fatted calf for him!' But we had to celebrate and rejoice, because this brother of yours was dead and has come to life; he was lost and has been found.'"

New Event Coming to Service Sunday

The Isaiah Project Community Partnerships Team is planning a "Repair Fair" as part of Service Sunday on June 1 this year. Our "Repair Fair" is patterned after the international movement called "Repair Café." Repair Café is part of a grassroots movement that aims to reduce waste, overconsumption, and planned obsolescence. It can ignite the do-it-together and do-it-yourself spirit!

The plan is to have volunteers on site from our church community who have talents in things like small appliance, lamp, bike, jewelry, and furniture repair; sewing and mending; basic phone/computer tech support; and knife/tool sharpening. Our church community will be able to bring items in for repair on that day. Our hope is to expand this project to include our neighborhood in the future.

This project has the potential to promote waste reduction and encourage a culture of repair. Volunteers (or Fix-It Friends) often share their knowledge with participants, which can help develop their own repair skills. This builds community around a shared goal of reducing waste, promoting sustainability, and neighbors helping neighbors.

Save the date if you can be a volunteer Fix-It Friend. And if you have a stash of things such as shirts that need a button, a chair that needs glueing, a smart phone question, etc., find them and save them for the Repair Fair, June 1. More information coming soon.



Land Covenant

Other tribes were forcibly re-located to this region by the actions of colonialism. Despite centuries of reprehensible treatment, the peoples of these sovereign nations are robust and enduring among us.

We are truly saddened by the genocide of their ancestors, the seizure of their lands, and the repression of their cultures and languages. We acknowledge that we benefit from the economic and social legacy left by settler colonialism.

We are grateful that many members of these original Nations have honorably served and defended the United States. We strive to honor their cultures and their insightful stewardship of this land and all creatures on it, recognizing our common interest in protecting its air, water, soils, and web of life for all future generations.

We commit ourselves through study and immersion experiences to learn the history and cultures of these peoples and their traditional knowledge.
