Pastor's Pen

Patience in Transition

Beloved church, we have been in transition a long time. Yet later this month we will finally welcome our second, permanent pastor and begin living into our new co-pastor model. In this new model we are also in the process of hiring a business administrator. We hope to accomplish this soon, but we have no hire date set. Only until we have all three roles filled will we finally be fully staffed. And then it's going to take some time for us all to live into this new model together, for key staff not even here yet to bond and offer their faithful leadership, for you as a church to make adjustments and learn how collaboration works.

My executive coach is the CEO of the Samaritan Counseling Foundation. We have met monthly for over twelve years! He is a guiding light of wisdom and institutional expertise. As he has walked with me through this series of transitions, his sage advice has served me well, and I believe will serve you well. Given the amount of time we have invested, the sacrifices we have made, and the commitment we all share in regarding this new leadership model, we need to take it slow. His advice is to take the rest of the calendar year as a period of careful discernment and slowly enact any permanent changes. Otherwise, we risk not being open to new ways of being church and new creative ideas brought forth in the new leadership structure. The Holy Spirit needs room to speak its whimsical mysteries and offer new possibilities. The coming months will be critical to not overload or force the final delegations to take place quickly.

Part of this process will be the intimate involvement of the Council Advisory Team (CAT) meeting with the new 3-part leadership trio. Their role is to oversee, help make decisions, help delegate, and act as general supervision on behalf of the council. Thus, the final portfolios of the committees, projects, teams, ministries, and work of the co-pastors and business administrator will all be vetted through that team. These three roles heavily influence the life of the entire church. Especially in the beginning, as we see the incredible potential of the Isaiah Project taking off and seek to honor the work of our gifted lay-leadership, CAT will be heavily involved.

In the meantime, I have been serving as the Temporary Head of Staff, a role set in motion by the Church Council last summer whose priorities are threefold: worship, staff development, council support & encouragement. I will be honest and say this has been a real challenge. The headspace that is required to oversee the creation and maintenance of our staff resources and work with the council in setting agendas while re-organizing worship and preaching is significant and fatiguing. But I have been doing this work on

and off, for years. My fifteen years of pastoral experience and additional leadership and HR training has been essential because without that, I would not have been qualified to lead us during this time. Thus, I am so grateful for another strong step to a more sustainable and I believe healthy model.

In his letter to the Colossians, the Apostle Paul writes:

May you be made strong with all the strength that comes from his glorious power, and may you be prepared to **endure everything with patience**, while joyfully giving thanks to the father who has enabled you to share in the inheritance of the saints in the light.

I pray that you can endure these coming months with me, with patience. I pray everyone can trust and have patience in this process. We have so much potential and ability to say "yes" to doing so many things. Yet it will take time to pick our "yes's" which is really a project of the church as a whole with Council and the CAT acting on your behalf. I joyfully give thanks for this long, careful, discernment process that will re-build the church into an even healthier, more vital, and more effective ministry to be a progressive light in the Fox Valley.

Thank God for you, patient Saints!

<u>Voting Information</u> for the proposed constitutional changes in the upcoming April 2 ballot/constitutional amendments which are on the ballot. In-person absentee voting is



from Tuesday, March 19 to Sunday, March 31, 2024.

Wisconsin constitutional amendments are on the April ballot. These will be binding and added to our Constitution if passed. Often the writing of the amendments is ambiguous, making it hard to understand...however, when assessing the immediate impact they

will have on how our elections are run, they are damaging to voter access and an additional constitutional amendment is not necessary. The Wisconsin Council of Churches and the nonpartisan LWV Wisconsin is urging voters to Vote No.

The questions on voters' ballots:

Question 1: *"Use of private funds in election administration.* Shall section 7 (1) of article III of the constitution be created to provide that private donations and grants may not be applied for, accepted, expended, or used in connection with the conduct of any primary, election, or referendum?"

Question 1: "Use of private funds in election administration.

Elections need to be fully funded. This amendment reduces the options for municipal governments looking for outside sources of funding for elections without providing alternative resources. This change will shift the burden even further onto taxpayers.

- 1. This change will have a negative impact on the voter experience and could lead to long lines and wait times at polling places, consolidated polling places, longer waits for election night results, and more due to lack of funding.
- 2. This change does not belong in our constitution. If the legislature wants to make this change, they should work with the governor to do so in a way that ensures our elections are fully funded.
- 3. Vote No on question 1 to ensure our clerks have the support and money they need to keep our elections running smoothly and securely.

Question 2: *"Election officials.* Shall section 7 (2) of article III of the constitution be created to provide that only election officials designated by law may perform tasks in the conduct of primaries, elections, and referendums?"

Question 2: *"Election officials.*

Elections are a lot of work. Clerks rely on a whole host of outside experts, volunteers, and community members to make sure our elections are run smoothly and the results are accurate.

1. Voter education organizations, like LWV, play a critical role in informing the public about their right to vote. This proposed change to our constitution ties the hands of our election officials from getting the outside support they need for our elections to function.

- 2. This change does not belong in our constitution. If the legislature wants to make this change, they should work with the governor to do so in a way that ensures our clerks are able to get the support they need to run our elections.
- 3. Vote No to question 2 to ensure our clerks have the support they need to run our elections and voters have the support they need to make informed decisions for our state.
